## April 2017 Program — Lou Cabeen

Lou Cabeen's presentation is titled "Collaging a Life". It will feature a range of her works from both before and after the onset of Rheumatoid Arthritis. Lou is a contemporary artist completely unafraid of the written word, mixing media, and celebrating textiles. She loves making art you can play with.

Lou works with a range of media including room scale textiles, stitched maps, and artist books. Making artist books allows her to fully explore the power of tactile experience in communicating her ideas. She uses cloth, paper and stitching to emphasize the tactile nature of our private experience and reveal the textures of subjective thought. Collage, using diverse imagery, materials and processes to create something new, is her constant inspiration. Her most recent work is inspired by environmental issues, from coal mining to watershed protection. She also explores the numinous and has created a series inspired by the legends of St. Clare of Assisi.

In all of her work, Lou seeks to build a literal body of knowledge, by researching the topic as well as paying close attention to her physical reaction to it. Usually the work teaches her, and after a piece is completed she realizes it has brought her home to herself—something her body has known, but her mind was not able to articulate. This process became more important as Lou has adjusted her studio practice to accommodate limitations from RA, a condition that appeared in her 50's. She recently stepped aside from her position as Associate Professor in Fiber at the University of Washington.

Her work can be found in a number of regional collections including the Museum of Contemporary Craft in Portland, the UW Book Arts collection, the Reed College Artists Book collection, and Bainbridge Island Museum of Art. Her solo show "The Geography of Hope", may be seen at Bainbridge Arts and Crafts, March 31–April 23, 2017.



## NWCS Summer Show

It's time to shake off our wet gray spring and get ready for the NWCS 2017 Summer Show! We're so excited to have this show at the Seattle City Hall, on two floors of the lobby. The



theme is "Hot Town - Summer in the City" so let those words inspire you!

Our juror for this show is **Larry Calkins**. Larry works with simple materials and objects that present some kind of history: rusted metal, found cloth, or scraps of wood. His typical paint medium is beeswax mixed with pigments.

Since 1995 he has been known for his dress sculptures with their simple, yet elegant shapes and leathery, tactile surfaces. Larry's most elaborate creations take the form of artist's books, using a wide variety of found and/or sculpted objects and informed by his background in the photo industry. He is currently represented by the Grover/Thurston Gallery in Seattle. For more information, visit his website.

### February Program Notes — Barbara De Pirro

Barbara De Pirro, a Golden Art Products representative and teacher since 2003, presented the program. She distributed a packet of information about Golden products and a sample bag to each member.

Barbara showed her own collage work and techniques in a powerpoint presentation. Some of her techniques incorporate her own photography work, copied in black and white on thin paper, so it may be easily torn. She paints her papers (a variety of weights, including silk tissue) and builds her artwork in multiple layers, often including monotypes, block prints, and collographs.

Barbara uses a variety of gels and medium, as glue and to add texture or build layers. Barbara passed around examples of her work using Golden products in a variety of techniques. Most of the samples included instructions on how to achieve the result illustrated in the sample. Questions and discussion followed this very informative program.

Here are the questions:

- What has defined you so far?
- What is it about your art that you feel you already do well?
  - What work has been a joy to you?
- Which pieces have brought you sales or recognition so far?
- What is it about being an artist that makes you most grateful?
  - What work has touched others?
- Is there something you've created for which you've received repeated positive feedback? Or perhaps it's something you've taught?
  - What do you do that is the most productive?

Those questions help you evaluate what brought you to the present. Now ask yourself what you want to bring you into the future with the following questions:

- What will define the artist you want to be?
- Will it be producing art that pleases you, or will it be making work that pleases others?
- Which type of work do you like to do most: receiving commissions or sales of studio paintings?
- Do you like or want to exhibit at certain shows, galleries or museums?
  - What do you want to be known for?

I hope you take a good look at these questions and come away with ideas to expand and further develop your collage work.






#### **NWCS Volunteers Needed**

#### To Read:



The Lost Painting (Jonathan Harr) is a wonderful read, a non-fiction that reads like a thriller. The book is a true account of the finding of a vanished painting by Michaelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio (1571–1610). The Taking of Christ was commissioned by a Roman nobleman in 1602, but as historical realism lost favor in the art world, it was relegated to the basement of art history. In 1802 the Mattei family sold it to a Scotsman, who then sold it to Dr Marie Lea-Wilson, an Irish pediatrician, who donated it to the Jesuits at University College Dublin in the 1930s. For many years the painting hung in the dining room, since it was believed to be only a copy of a Caravaggio. Then in 1990, conservators from the National Gallery of Ireland were evaluating the art collection of the Jesuits in Dublin, and as cleaning of this painting began, it became apparent that it was not a copy! You'll have to read the book for the rest of the story.

The Taking of Christ now hangs in the National Gallery in Dublin (on permanent loan from the Jesuits), and I was lucky enough to see this on our recent Ireland trip. Lately, there are many more books with art themes, which is great for those of us who not only like to make art, but read about it as well.


