

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Welcome to 2023. I hope everyone had fun creating for the "Heel, Toe and Away We Go" Spring Show. Our Zoom workshop on scroll making is just around the corner on February 21st, be sure to mark your calendars! Many of you are currently participating in our winter "activity" with the high school students which is wonderful, as community outreach has always been one of the NWCS active goals. It is a gratifying opportunity to exchange a collage with a student.

Think about this - Are we merely painting with our papers or are we collecting and categorizing? Are collage artists cataloguists? Do they all have an inner hankering for order and organizing? Do we gravitate towards randomness, so we can pull the threads together to create order? A predominantly common theme among collagists is they are collectors. Is this perhaps an extension of a cataloguist? Rearranging order. Piecing and re-piecing bits of narrative into a whole. And what do we leave out? What is missing from our collections and cataloguing, which itself is an unspoken narrative? Try leaving some open space in your collage, the negative window of what could be there.

TIPS AND TRICKS

How to view a piece of your art with a critical eye—your "What-Do-I-Need-To-Change" Checklist (adapted from an old NWCS newsletter)

Are there too many or too few shapes? Do I need to add a line to lead the eye of the viewer?

Do the collage elements I've added vary in size or are they too "samey?"

□ Look at the negative space, are the shapes they form varied?

Does the work have a color or temperature dominance? Is it mostly warm or cool?

□ Is the underlying structure of the design still obvious?

Are the accents and quiet areas harmonious?

Have I considered the corners? How can I treat each corner differently?

Have I considered the edges of the substrate? Can areas of my composition break the frame instead of staying inside the border?

How can shapes be organized? Grouped? Overlapped? Repeated? Touching at tangents?

□ What is the tonal range of the piece? Is there a broad range of darks, highlights, midtones or is the tonal range limited?

□ Are there bulls-eye darks or eye-popping whites that distract needlessly?

Are the edges of my elements integrated into the piece? Could I have painted the stark white edge on the perimeter of a cut out with gouache, a pencil, a colored pencil, or a felt tipped pen?

□ Is the entire surface part of the whole?

Have I done everything possible to express the ONE thing I set out to express?

February 21, 2023

In the tradition of Marble-ology (2020) and Text-ology (2021), the year 2023 brings you "Scroll-ology." Participants will learn about the history and components of the book and art forms known colloquially as scrolls. We will view several examples and styles, and consider the various ways in which scrolls have been and continue to be used. Through suggestions and prompts, NWCS members will be guided to create their own collaged scrolls. This roughly 90-minute workshop led by NWCS Program Chair Kathryn Kim will be offered via Zoom, as a prelude to an upcoming NWCS exhibit with a scroll theme. NWCS APRIL PROGRAM

April 15, 2023

Sherry Ying Ruden will join NWCS members at the Shoreline Masonic Center in April 2023 to discuss her innovative use of traditional materials, namely Chinese rice paper, paint, ink, and cold wax. Sherry is an award-winning artist based in Seattle whose paintings have been widely exhibited nationally. Inspired by her life in the East and West, Sherry uses Chinese Xuan (rice) paper, which, though fragile, is surprisingly versatile. She continuously experiments with different methods, resulting in striking but subtle and luminescent outcomes. In contrast to Chinese paintings created with brush and ink, where the artwork is mounted afterwards, Sherry reverses the process, manipulating the material and creating shapes and colors based on the paper's natural grain and texture. She calls her approach Zì-Rán 自然, which in Chinese means Nature, or the



interconnectedness of all things. Sherry's artistic process is specific yet spontaneous, allowing the



imagery to evolve organically. Sherry's work nods to traditional Chinese brush painting but goes well beyond the expected, connecting her surfaces to our contemporary world.

'Every Picture Tells a Story Don't It' at Rosehill

he Northwest Collage Society's fall show brought out artists and art enthusiasts for an opening reception Thursday, Nov. 17, at the Rosehill Community Center.

The theme of the show was "Every Pic-ture Tells a Story Don't It," and featured a wide range of "collage" inspired art, not to be confused with college art. A collage is a work of formal art made by gluing different pieces of paper, photographs, fabric, and other ephemera onto a supporting surface. thus creating a new whole. The term collage was coined by both Georges Braque and Pablo Picasso at the beginning of the 20th century when collage became a distinctive part of modern art.

Multimedia artist Craig van den Bosch was the juror for this show of visual storytelling through collage. The exhibit, which runs through Jan. 25, features more than 70 regional artists.

The Lodge at St. Edward Park will be hosting two collage workshops on Saturday, March 11 and Sunday, March 12 to celebrate Women's History month 2023: Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Story. Collage: Paint with Paper Combined with Bookbinding

The first workshop, on Saturday, March 11 will combine painting with paper and book binding. You will

create a collaged art journal from recycled materials in just one day. This art experience will take you on a journey of expression. The instructor, John Arbuckle, will lead you on a meaningful and enjoyable art adventure. You will learn a variety of collage techniques that will enhance your art experience. This workshop is open to all artists, beginners to advanced. Most materials will be provided in the workshop. A minimal supply list will be provided to you when you sign up.



Small but Mighty

The second workshop on Sunday, March 12 will

introduce you to tiny collage making in an ATC (artist trading card) sized journal. This 2.5 inch by 3.5 inch book will become a treasure to keep or give as a gift. We will be using recycled materials in this workshop. A variety of different collage techniques will be introduced to provide you with an adventure into a miniature world. This workshop is open to artists at all levels. Most materials will be provided in the workshop. A minimal supply list will be provided to you when you sign up.

John Arbuckle has taught for over 45 years in elementary schools and middle schools, adult education centers at a local college, festival workshops, and The Pacific NW Art School. His work can be found in personal art collections in many countries and is shown frequently at NW Collage Society exhibits. His work is shared daily on his blog <u>Artjuvenation</u>.

Kevin Sampsell is a writer and collage artist based in Portland, Oregon and is a co-curator of <u>Sharp Hands</u> <u>Gallery</u>. He is the publisher of <u>Future Tense Books</u> and the author and editor of several books including the novel, *This Is Between Us* (Tin House Books). He wrote the collage column, <u>Paper Trumpets</u>, on <u>TheRumpus.net</u>, for thirty installments and started the <u>Open Collage Night</u> at the Independent Publishing Resource Center in Portland. <u>His collages</u> have appeared in *Kolaj Magazine, Clackamas Literary Review, Chicago Quarterly Review, Black Candies, Entropy*, and elsewhere. His book of collages and poems, *I Made an Accident*, was recently published by <u>Clash Books</u>.


Danielle Krysa is a collage artist, author, and curator from British Columbia. She is the writer behind the contemporary art site, <u>The Jealous Curator</u>, runs the podcast <u>Art for Your Ear</u>, and the author of <u>Creative</u> <u>Block, Collage, Your Inner Critic Is A Big Jerk</u>, and <u>How to</u> <u>Spot an Artist</u>. Danielle lives and works in British Columbia, Canada.

Her new children's book, <u>Art and Joy Best Friends</u> <u>Forever</u>, helps artists aged five and up discover the joy of artistic expression while silencing self-criticism.

This is the story of two best friends—Art and Joy—and how they overcome the insidious "Art Bully" that criticizes their creative endeavors. Danielle Krysa knows that kids have an inner critic too—the kind that tells them their artworks are stupid, messy, the wrong color, or just plain wrong.

Employing the same arch humor that make her books for adults so relatable and helpful, Krysa illustrates this uplifting tale with her brilliantly colored collages and witty typography. As Art and Joy learn how to tap into their imaginations and shrug off the Art Bully, they also discover some clever ways to get their creative juices flowing using color, shape, line and found objects.

Kids of all ages will find enthusiastic support and valuable inspiration in this playful parable.




Unconnected Yet is an exhibition about the junction between things—creativity that explores a combination of art and science or cross-curricular inquiry. It explores art that points to the gap: things to be connected, something to be spanned, a subject to better understand, an unexperienced phenomenon, an unnamed or unseen thing, something that has not yet occurred, or something unexplainable. Artists were asked to "Imagine the world you want to live in as it yet could be. What would you connect if you could?"

Unconnected Yet assembles the work of 64 collagebased artists from 10 countries via printed facsimiles of the artwork selected. Unconnected Yet links the art and science communities of Boston, Kolkata, and beyond, bringing art from near and far to five galleries at the Academy of Fine Arts in Kolkata, India.

Language can divide us or bring us together. And yet some nuances are still lost in translation; will you continue to walk across that bridge of understanding or resist its possibilities? This piece ponders the gulf between my American English and my partner's Punjabi to suggest ways of connecting and finding meaning even in the misunderstandings.

India has over 300 million cows, and these cattle, as well as goats and other ruminant animals, produce over 13 tonnes of methane yearly. Methane is a potent greenhouse gas that has over 80 times the global warming power of carbon dioxide, and methane has contributed to over 30% of global warming to date. Methane could be captured from both the manure and the burps of livestock. This methane could then be transformed into urea for cattle feed, electricity, fuel, plastics, plexiglass, aerosol propellants, antifreeze, fire extinguisher fluid, neoprene, Teflon, solvents, and more.


Gina Hanzsek (above) will be showing her collages at Danestyles Hair Artistry in Snohomish in February and March.

COLLAGE ACTIVITIES

NWCS member **Andrea Lewicki** runs the <u>@specialagentcollagecollective</u>, a global collective of 80+ collage artists. She creates theme-based collage challenges, occasional online collage hangouts, print and digital zines, and other interactive activities.

Your mission, if you choose to accept it, is to create a smiling collage and leave it in a public place. You'll need to leave your collage for someone to find in the spirit of putting a smile on their face.

Snap two photos -- one of the collage to show what you made, and one of the collage at the drop site. On the back, write something like "Signaling a Smile for <u>@specialagentcollagecollective</u>" and your Instagram handle if you like.

Identify the collage with <u>@specialagentcollagecollective</u> + <u>#signalasmile</u>. Add your Instagram handle, too, if you'd like.

A completed mission includes a photo documenting the drop. Send it to HQ by <u>email</u> or use the <u>official entry form</u>. HQ will share your entry on Instagram and celebrate your success. You will receive an official Special Agent membership card in the mail.

Posting your entry is encouraged! Share a general location. Exact coordinates are not required.

About the Special Agent Collage Collective:

SACC was created in August 2021 to interact with other collage artists and enjoy shared art-making with a generous dose of silliness. We have longtime hobbyists, college students, authors,

filmmakers, scientists, accomplished professional artists, and collage newcomers.

Don't let the intrigue and dark sunglasses fool you. Underneath it all we are a somewhat nerdy group of collagists who never stop being amazed at what magic can unfold from a few scraps of paper, a sharp blade, and a fresh glue stick. The compulsion to cut and paste is strong with us.

A membership card and Special Agent number are issued once a completed mission or collage challenge is submitted. The collective enthusiastically welcomes new members. There are no dues or submission fees, although HQ gratefully accepts contributions to cover postage and supplies.





ONLINE COLLAGE ACTIVITIES



Cut and Paste Club is an online community of collage artists that meets online the second Monday of every month from 5-6pm. Membership is FREE and there is no commitment to attend. Participants find some sense of structure through guided prompts, a regular practice to exercise their creative muscle, accountability to keep up with your art practice, and a sense of community to share their artwork and learn from others.

Each month, the host of the group sends a prompt to the group via email. Some examples of previous prompts are create a collage using:

- Text utilizing typography to great effect by incorporating words, letters, phrases, and symbols into abstract compositions.
- Hands look for pictures of hands in different poses and create a collage using hands as the focal element.
- Mixed Media create a collage sourcing from paper materials while incorporating another medium within your collage.


